





Membership Spotlight



Martin Popov



One of JCCA's newer members is Martin Popov, born in the Republic of Bulgaria before moving to the United States with his parents. As a bilingual undergraduate student in both Slavic languages, Bulgarian and Russian, Martin worked extensively on individual and group projects, with a main focus on researching and investigating the former Intelligence Services as well as Intelligence Officers of the Eastern Bloc and their involvement in shaping the current geopolitical events in the Balkans, particularly in the Republic of Bulgaria and the Russian Federation (from 1991 till present day). He is an author of numerous course projects throughout his undergraduate career that required research skills, organizing and analyzing various types of information from various databases.


Some of these projects include, "Russian Media and Law Enforcement," with emphasis on the problems related to Russian media and law enforcement during Vladimir Putin's Presidency 2000-2023, as well as retrospect on the war in Chechnya and the involvement of the Federal Security Service (FSB) in the poisoning of the ex-FSB operative Alexander Litvinenko in England in 2006."Female Suicide Bombers: The Chechen Black Widows", with emphasis on the Chechen women and their struggles with centuries old Muslim traditions versus present Islamic fundamentalism.

With an interest in government service, Popov worked at the Arizona Attorney General's Office, Special Investigation Division, where, through excellent teamwork, communication, interpersonal, analytical, and computer skills, he was awarded a *Certificate of Appreciation in 2011*.

He also worked as a Senate Page during Arizona State Senate's 51ST Legislature, 2nd Regular session, where he performed various duties such as attending to the needs of the Senators while on the Senate Chamber floor and delivering correspondence to the Secretary of State, the Governor, and the Chief Clerk's Office. As a result of his performance, he was awarded a Certificate "Page of the Month" in January 2014 and a *"Certificate of Appreciation"* by the President of Arizona State Senate in April of 2014.

Popov is a recipient of the prestigious FBI National Academy Academic Scholarship and the Association of Certified Fraud Examiners Academic Scholarship. Martin is also a member of the Association of Former Intelligence Officers (AFIO), working closely with active and former members of the US intelligence community, the International Association for Intelligence Education (IAFIE), The OSINT Foundation, and the Institute for Defense and Government Advancement (IDGA). He holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminology and Criminal Justice from the College of Public Programs, Arizona State University, Class of 2013.

Popov enjoys outdoor travel in his spare time with his personally maintained 1995 and 1996 Jaguars Vanden Plas, US specs/ or Daimler Sovereign UK specs. Late Jaguar Chief Designer Geoff Lawson originally designed both X300 models in production from 1994 to 1997.



To my surprise, Mike Savos, Inland Empire President, Mark Mayuga (JCNA Dir.), and Charlie Hallums (LA Club) created a double Concours. First Saturday was the local IE Show, followed by Sunday's Southwest Regional Concours. Gaining points from two shows offered an incentive to accept the road challenge and unforeseen dramas.

On Sept. 27/28, in remembrance of the 19'20s classic song, "California Here I Come," 8 JCCA "Trailer Queen" Ambassadors set out for an eventful Idyllwild, CA, trek.

Drama: 11 a.m. Flemings' 65 E-Type having its first Championship judging following restoration. Mountain

thunderstorm begins with sprinkles. Judges spend an excessive amount of time discussing point infractions. Fleming, listed by many as an E-type expert, prepares appeal.



Drama: None for Browns' MK2 Saloon. Maybe it pays to be a member of both clubs.

Drama: Schafers Judging S2 Modified: (Not competing against Fleming's Championship Class.) Sprinkling increased to rain. Like Fleming, a possible appeal of the same deduction on the length of rubber around the front bumper area.

Drama: Heavy thunderstorm expected at 6 p.m., corresponding to the time for the Idyllwild outdoor gourmet dinner and awards ceremony. Event moved to 3 p.m. No time to re-dress. Put on car covers and, with less than a recognizable rendition of "Singing in The Rain," moved to Ferro's restaurant.

Drama: None. Browns touched up their Cat, Flemings untrailered Black Beauty, and Schafers uncovered E-Type's British Flag protective shroud. Ceramic glaze did its job!

Drama: Some. "Rags Down," Judging started, mostly the same judges as the first day. Schafers were off and running with

mechanicals. All lights and horns worked. Browns continued conversations with LA members. Judges again logged errant infractions from day one against Fleming.

Drama: Judging Over: in preparation for the Champagne Car Parade through Idyllwild and a drive to Inspiration Point, Schafers couldn't get the T-Type started. Inland Empire LA clubs all provide diagnostic help. Bob Brown and Keith Webb (LA CLUB) provided diagnosis, replaced the Coil, and cleaned the connectors. used with classic brands) became my vehicle of choice. As a teen learning to drive, my father's XK140 OTS roared out the driveway, and the "Jag Passion Bug" bit. I have had a long history with the Jaguar Clubs of North America (JCNA), the Jaguar Association



of Greater Indiana (JAGI), and I later became a member of the Jaguar Club of Central Az (JCCA). The "Jaguar Bug" became a disease of passion when I purchased the 1956 XK140 OTS, 1988 XJSC, 1997 XJ6 VDP, 1999 XJ8 OTS, 2000 S Sedan, and 2008 XK. When asked to be an officer, coordinate clubs and many show events, participate as a judge, and serve as a Chief Judge, my pride tugged a bit. This is not just a "guy thing!" We have many women owners, officers, and committee members. For many new to our gatherings, the following descriptions may give you insight into our car hobby's enjoyment, excitement, and pride.

Cars & Coffee (Jags & Java)

"Thinking Outside the Box" JCCA, wanting to advertise our Marque, changed the name to Jags & Java. These meets are generally held at the Chandler Jaguar/Land Rover dealership on the East side of the valley and the Arrowhead Jaguar/Land Rover dealership on the west side. J&Js are open to all mem-



bers, friends, and passersby. We often pick up a few guests (potential members) waiting for their cars in dealership service areas. If you are thinking ahead, you can make a dealership reservation, come to J&J, and have

your car serviced at the same time. We often feature a "class" of Jags to discuss and view members' cars. During the inside coffee and pastries gatherings, informal meetings are held covering the latest events of the Club.

Car Shows - Multiple & Single Marques

JCCA's Car Shows are another way for us to "Think Outside the Box." It is the informal way of "learning about our Marque and its different Classes. While it is not a sanctioned Jaguar Club of North America (JCNA) meet for national points, it establishes a camaraderie between our members and others (potential members) wanting to show off their Jags. This is a great place to learn about the pitfalls and advantages of owning a particular year, make, and model Jag. Owners look forward to sharing details about their car and how difficult, easy, or expensive a restoration was. JCCA's Car Shows judging offers viewers and

owners the opportunity to pick awards like People's Choice, Best Theme (creative idea based on car year, Class, or season, often with decorations and owner's attire to match). Many owners display history items or pictures of cars in restoration. PLAN TO

Concours d'Elegance – JCNA Sanctioned Events & Judges Training

Surviving the COVID age, our Club is "Thinking Outside the Box" for new approaches to our Concours d'Elegance. While using the old weekend approach, hotel and food prices have escalated, fewer trained judges exist, and fewer spectators participate. As we prepare for our 2024 Concours, we are looking at partner participation with other events as a venue for additional spectators. Use our November 18th JCCA Car Show as an introduction to hands-on Judges Training to gain knowledge about classes, become an apprentice judge, or aid in renewing your JCNA certificate. The following are some history and current procedures for sanctioned JCNA Concours.

Wikipedia's *Concours d'Elegance* History: (French: *Concours d'élégance*) is a term of French origin that means a "competition of elegance" and refers to an event where prestigious vehicles are displayed and judged. It dates back to <u>17th</u> -century France, where aristocrats paraded horse-drawn carriages in the parks of Paris during summer weekends and holidays. Over time, carriages became horseless, and the gatherings became a competition among vehicle owners to be judged on the appearance of their vehicles.



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The sanctioned Concours d'Elegance competition events sponsored by the Jaguar Clubs of North America, Inc. (JCNA) have operated from JCNA's beginning under rules agreed upon by the affiliated Clubs. "Guidelines for JCNA-sanctioned events have evolved by conscientious trial and error over the last several decades, says former JCNA President Les Hamilton. They are not perfect by any means, but the JCNA Rules have set the owners of Jaguar automobiles on a correct course, seeking originality and authenticity. The desire is to promote uniformity of judging at JCNA-sanctioned Concours d'Elegance competition events.". Only the most current edition of the Rule Books is used in operating and judging any JCNA Sanctioned Concours.



The rules are mandatory for all events leading to the North American JCNA Concours d'Elegance Division Championships. A summary of key rules follows below. If your passion is developing, complete Rule Books, including specific car Classes, can be downloaded or purchased online at the JCNA website.

The primary purpose of the JCNA Concours is to encourage the owners of Jaguars to preserve, maintain, and present their Jaguars in as clean and authentic a condition as possible (see Chapter II for exceptions to authenticity in Special Division Classes). A secondary purpose is to celebrate all Jaguars and their owners by creating an event where people may share all degrees of interest in owning, driving, maintaining, and restoring Jaguars.

JCNA's Concours year runs from January 1 through November 30. Concours levels include Club, Regional, and National events, e.g., the International Jaguar Festival. For Concours scores to be eligible for annual JCNA Concours Standings, Champion Division, Special Division, and Driven Division competition must be offered at each Concours. Whether you show or not, many members become "Concours Groupies" and set their vacations based on US, Canada, and Mexico visitations. Not only are there Concours to view, but often, there are speakers, tours, and award activities.

Winning an award often helps with the provenance when selling your car. Locally prepared trophies are provided at the Club's discretion; some Clubs present perpetual trophies (engraved with the name of the yearly recipient) and return them to the Club for re-presentation each year. Clubs may also present trophies (of their design and at their own expense) in recognition of accomplishments such as Best in Show, Longest Distance Driven To Compete, Longest Distance Trailered To Compete, Oldest Jaguar in Show, Best Engine Compartment, Hard Luck (En-Route Damage), Display Peoples' Choice. At the conclusion of each JCNA Concours year and at the next North American Annual Meeting, Concours d'Elegance Awards are presented three deep, in each of the Champion, Special, and Driven Division Classes. These annual awards are determined by averaging the Entry's 3 highest scores during the Concours year. Entries competing in 3 or more JCNA Concours automatically become eligible for a North American award in their particular Division and Class.

<u>The Champion Division</u> is the most demanding JCNA Concours Division. It challenges its Entrants to research, prepare, and present the judged portions of their cars in their original, authentic, factory-delivered configuration and condition. All Entries in the Champion Division will have their interiors, exteriors, engine compartments, and boots judged for authenticity, condition, and cleanliness.

The Driven Division also challenges its Entrants to research, prepare, and present their Entries in their original, authentic, factory-delivered configuration and condition. However, Driven Division is for Jaguars that, regardless of age, are in regular use. In consideration of this usage, Driven Division Entries do not have their engine compartments or boots judged, and certain convenience and safety-related authenticity exceptions are allowed. The exteriors and interiors of Driven Division Entries are judged to the same standard as Champion Division.

The Special Division Classes include S1/PD Factory-produced and prepared Competition Jaguars, factory-sponsored Competition, and Limited Production Jaguars.

The S2 Modified Class is for Jaguar vehicles of any year and model that have been substantially personalized, modified, or customized. Entries must be equipped with functional horns, headlights, taillights, brake lights, parking lights, license plate lights, backup lights, and turn signals appropriate to the vintage. To be eligible for this classification S2/MOD, entries must be submitted in advance with a list of 40 points or more of deductions for judged, non-authentic, or missing features or components.

At a Concours, the non-communicative glance scrutinizes and critiques your prized and super clean hobby car, all with one sweep of the eyes. Ugh, was that a good or bad jerk of the head as the judge picks up the clipboard with your car's score sheet attached.

The judging team, (Championship=3/4; Driven=2/3) who have earned the status of Certified or Apprentice judge, break into their individual judging responsibility: interior, exterior (paint, scratches, and body fit) engine compartment (Championship only, screws, bolts, rubber, etc.), all areas are judged on cleanliness and authenticity. Your responsibility is to stand aside without comment. The appropriate judge will make a technical observation by having you turn on and off lights, turn signals and using the horn. Multiple horns must have the correct tone and each horn must be heard during the one-tap of the horn demonstration.

Judgement is against the condition the car was originally delivered in. Judges are not supposed to communicate with each other about the vehicles unless they need help determining things like if the wipers work, lights come on, etc. Points are taken for damaged, dirty, or missing parts.

What are the judging criteria?

- The judges are instructed that a car does not have to be perfect but to look for an "excellent car"
- Judgement is not given based on the car it's parked next to or any other car in the show. Judgement is against the condition the car was originally delivered in. Authenticity points are taken away when a part is chrome when it was originally
- painted/brushed/etc.

How Jaguar Marque and Model Cars at Concours Are Usually Judged (or How They Should Be)

You have an impressive ride, there is no doubt about that — so why didn't it sweep the board at the latest Concours you entered it in? Mainly because the standardized Concours takes a lot of the "fun" aspects out of judging. That super custom paint job, or Gen-III engine swap isn't going to get a trophy at sanctioned Jaguar Concours. What most Concours judges value is authentic restoration, which some people view as "correct" and some view as "boring."

Therefore, if you want to take top prize at a Jaguar Concours, a 100-point restoration is the "easy" way to do it. But of course, there's nothing easy about a 100-pt resto, not to mention, there's a LOT to be said for classics that aren't 100% classic. (See Modified Categories.)



How to be disgualified In Championship Concours

The car has a replica body The braking system isn't authentic There is no approved fire extinguisher Non-safety glass in exterior windows Non-authentic transmission Non-authentic engine

Finally, here are the main authenticity deductions entries have to deal with. (The exception to any of these would be if the factory included these details):

> Turn signals are modern or commercial The car has sealed beam headlights Hose clamps are incorrect for the era The exterior of the wiring is plastic Upholstery is made of synthetic materials Vinyl or plastic is used on tops or boots Non-authentic air conditioning Non-authentic power steering

The key take-aways: The purpose of entering your car is simply to see where your car stacks up to the authentic check-list or approved modifications checklist. Showing your car sets you apart from the club membership simply because you enjoy your car so much; you want others to enjoy it also. Championship or Driven categories; either one is a great way to see if there are any improvements you can make to your car to bring up your score. It is all optional.

There Goes The Judge; a nice person without the clipboard!

A competition is an event in which many people participate to determine who is <u>best</u> at a particular activity. It could be purebred dogs, bodybuilding, baking apple pies, or Jaguar cars. Hence, the Concours d-Elegance was born to determine the best of Jaguars cars. Competitions like Concours require judges and clear criteria for determining the best.

Starting in 1975, the JCNA Concours Committee compiled the first edition of the Rule Book. The Rule Book was created to set clear judging criteria so participants know how their entries will be judged. The criteria will also tell the judges what to look for and how to assign values. It minimizes the bias and provides a guideline to educate new judges. They are not perfect by any means, but the JCNA Rules have set the owners of Jaguar cars on the correct path, seeking authenticity, cleanliness, condition, and appearance.

Judging a competition can be a challenging task. It requires a lot of attention to detail and fairness, but does not require a judge to be an expert in every detail of every Jaguar car ever created. To become a judge, an individual must pass an openbook test on a range of Jaguar car questions. Judges' training can be carried out with in-person, video sessions, and studying the rule book for a specific class. "Thinking outside the box," JCCA proposes to use a Car Show approach giving future judges or those looking to improve their skills a hands-on experience in addition to other types of training. This approach gives judges a chance to know what they are looking for during a Concours.

JCNA Concours committee(s) developed a score sheet (checklist) with simple items such as working horn, lights, and cleanliness. The scoresheet also includes values for each infraction for fairness. Judging is done in teams of 2-3 judges, and the Chief Judge should include an experienced Judge in each group. If there is a question regarding any item on the scoresheet, the Judges can defer to the Chief Judge, who has access to the Rule Book library.

Here's a sample portion of a score sheet:

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JCNA Concours events have 3 divisions of competition: Champion, Driven, and Special. You can select the Division that best suits your needs based on your car, experience, and competitive nature. If you are not ready for competition, you may place your car in Display. The club will set award parameters for cars in this Division.

When scoring, Judges mark any deductions on the 3–4-page score sheet and turn them over to the Scoring team to calculate the final score. If the Scoring team has questions regarding a deduction, they will bring the score sheet to the Chief Judge or individual Judge for clarification. Therefore, judges must write (print) clearly. After the judging, the Chief Judge reviews the score sheets and assigns the appropriate award, if warranted. These awards are typically given shortly after the Concours event.

Note that you cannot judge in that category if you entered a car. If there is only one car in a category, it must pass at least 90 points to receive an award. If you are not showing a car but have a penchant for numbers, volunteer for the scoring committee. It takes at least 3 scorers per Concours to validate all scoresheets. Once the awards are given, the Chief Judge and an assistant validate the sheets again and forward scores back to the participants and JCNA. When participants enter 3 JCNAsanctioned shows or more, they are placed into the regional and national competition for yearly awards. Judging is essential



to the Concurs event and a great way to broaden your Jaguar knowledge. In addition, you will get to see some amazing Jaguars up close.

David Champion, our new Chief Judge, comes to JCCA with a British accent and a wealth of car experience. In preparation for our 2024 Concours, Dave is soliciting members who would like to take an easy walk-through learning to Judge or those who need to renew their certificates. In "Thinking Outside the Box," a hands-on compare and contrast of cars within classes offers an excellent introduction to training—other trainings to be scheduled later in the year and early 2024.

Sign up for the fun Judges' Training at the November 18 Roaring '20s Car Show - Event of the Year!

To view JCNA's 2023 judging items go to the JCNA website. You need to be sure you are registered with your JCNA number. On the left side menu, it may say logout, hit it and it will change to member log in. If you are registered your user name is your JCNA number, enter your password. Go back to the left menu, drop down to Events, hit it and select Concours. Select any items you are interested in. Scroll about 2/3rds down to see a full 2023 sample Score Sheet. Remember, Jaguar regional and national award points are often helpful in getting full value when you decide to sell your car.




Judge Certification Status In accordance to JCNA Concours rules, the following certification codes are used:

• After receiving Rule Book and Score Sheet training, taking the written JCNA Judge's Test, and performing practice judging, all successfully and under the supervision of a Chief Judge, a candidate is listed as an Apprentice Judge, (status"A"), and becomes eligible to serve as an Apprentice Judge.

• After successfully serving as an Apprentice Judge, and with the Chief Judge's approval, the Apprentice Judge becomes a Certified Judge (status "J").

• When a judge is no longer current, he/she is not deleted Instead, the status is changed to ("E" expired).
